Minister

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Dear Friends,

The events of Easter day and beyond are a far cry from the ministry of healing and wholeness, teaching and discipling, and bringing all kinds of people into the fold of God's love, that was the focus of Jesus' life up to that point. Just as the events of Easter are in complete contrast to the reflective calm of the 40 days of Lent.

At Easter we move from the quiet, contemplative days of Lent into the horrors of what Jesus went through on Good Friday. Then we move from the sense of grief and loss to the joy of knowing once again the result of that act of complete self-sacrifice, as we celebrate the raising up of God's son to new life. In a matter of days we encounter such differing and tumultuous emotions that besides the stone at the grave being overturned, we can find ourselves overturned, pummeled, exhausted with grief and yet then radiant with a joy that has no comparison. For all this Jesus went through for us... for me... for you... and its impact on us is immense. So it still is a touching and overwhelming reality for us two thousand years later, and the outcome is no less overwhelming - he did this for us! 'He conquered death, he is King of kings' as a well known Easter hymn reminds us. He did this for us...

I can't help but imagine what emotions were breaking God's heart in heaven as all this took place here on earth, with God's son's blood on our hands. The overwhelming sadness and grief, the heartache and loss as he turned away from his own son is those final days. God could not intervene. Jesus had to experience the fullness of death on his own, no neatly packaged miracle so that Jesus didn't feel the pain as the nails were hammered into his wrists and ankles, or the distress bursting in his heart with the fear of the unknown as he looked ahead to his certain and God ordained death. What must God have felt as his son cried out into the void, 'My God, my God, why have you forsaken me? Why have you abandoned me?' What tears must have fallen in heaven?

When in life we find ourselves being pummeled and washed this

way and that with the tides of life, we can take heart that in knowing that God has been there, Jesus has been there. God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit has been there in the midst of such grief, such fear, such isolation from all that is good and right, caught in the midst of all that is bad and full of anguish. And they were there deliberately, out of choice, in order to remove from our lives all that is sinful, all that fills our heart with such pain, all that is overburdening us in our lives. They were there in order to set us free.

No matter what happens in our lives, when we live with Jesus in our hearts we can know that none of this can stay overburdening us because the joy and love of God's resurrected Son is so overwhelming that it pushes the out of our lives all the bad and painful stuff which is too much for us to hold onto, too much for us to bear alone. Jesus hangs there on the cross with arms open wide ready to receive all that is too much for us... leaving us instead overwhelmed by his love.

So let us this Easter allow our lives to be overwhelmed with the love and care of God, who is carrying us on into better times, building the church, reclaiming and restoring one person at a time. Lord Jesus, lead us on, with such encouragement, to a place where we can daily know of your loving presence ministered to us through the love and care of others around us.

Guisborough


"Don't look back." was one of the themes for the parade service I lead at Marton recently. It is easy to say but not so easy to do. It doesn't mean we should forget the past or fail to learn from experience, but it does mean we should not cling onto the past as this can stop us from living in the present or looking forward to the future.

This week sees the Guisborough Church AGM and the Spring meeting of Northern Synod. These are opportunities to look back and reflect but also to celebrate the present moment and to look forward to the future. This activity seems particularly relevant as we are beginning the process of LMMR (local ministry and mission review) as a church and as a group. We are asked to begin by looking at our Pastorate Profile which dates back 10 years to when we called Catey to be our minister. How much has changed since then? Have we moved on as much as we had hoped? What have we lost along the way? The most poignant change is the closing of our churches at Linthorpe and Lingdale. In our individual churches some activities have come and gone, while new ones have been taken up as the need arises.

Over the years we have often paused to take stock of where we are and where we want to be. Do you remember "Catch the Vision", "Vision 4 Life" and Vision 2020? Do you still remember your Vi-

sion 2020 priorities for mission? I didn't think I did but I found my old booklet and Identity, Spirituality and Prayer, and Evangelism seem most familiar. Looking for a record of these decisions taken more than 5 years ago is like looking for a needle in a haystack.

As a denomination from the Reformed tradition, for our church life, we are expected to look back to the early church. In the Acts of the Apostles and Paul's letter we find a pattern for worship, meeting together and serving the community and we could do a lot worse than to look back at their example. However our challenge is not to remain stuck in the past but to keep pace with the changes in

society and meet the new needs around us while holding onto our original values. It doesn't pay to dwell too long on past triumphs if it leads to thinking things will never be as good as they were. It also doesn't pay to dwell too long on past failures if it makes us afraid to start out on a new project.

Isaiah tells us God wants us to

"Forget about what's happened; don't keep going over old history. Be alert, be present. I'm about to do something brand-new. It's bursting out! Don't you see it?" (Isaiah 43:16-21 The Message)

Paul in his letter to the Philippians tells us to be single-minded: Forgetting the things that are behind and reaching out for the things that are ahead. (Phi. 3:13 NET)

We can learn a lot from the past but we can also face the future with confidence.

As the writer of Hebrews says "Let us have confidence, then, and approach God's throne where there is grace. There we will receive mercy and find grace to help us just when we need it." (Hebrews 4:16 GNB) Thank God for that.
