Cyclone Aila tore through Bangladesh in May 2009 causing huge tidal surges which covered the area in sea water and left salt behind in the soil and fresh water.

Combined with the longer-term effects of climate change such as rising sea levels, Cyclone Aila was too much for those families whose homes were destroyed and whose lands were submerged in the storm.

Many families have been forced to leave their villages, becoming 'floating people' without any means of earning a living. As hundreds of thousands of people are still experiencing the affects of Cyclone Aila two years on, it is now considered to be the most prolonged emergency ever in Bangladesh.

In this harsh environment, with the help of Christian Aid partner, Shushilan, two extraordinary young women have seen new possibilities and are shining a light to the future for their communities.

There has been a tenuous link between the Hinmers family and our church since the first minister left Guisborough to take up the pastorate at Great Ayton. In 1876 the late minister's son gave a donation of £50 to help the church clear a debt and then two years later offered to make a very generous contribution of £500 towards an ill fated scheme to replace the chapel with a new church. Such an amount was equivalent to a minister's stipend for five years – but was never paid. At the centenary the minister's grandson, Joseph, attended the celebrations and last year Bill Hinmers, an airline pilot from Banbury, and the great, great, great grandson of the Rev Hinmers came to visit us in Guisborough.

From the churchyard it was straight to the West Green for the start of the treasure hunt. From an old eighteenth century cottage the trail of mystery wended its way along the high street to the former Ayton School building, but the main goal was Suggitt's ice cream parlour.
