Dear Friends.

The big thing this month just has to be the Diamond Jubilee celebrations of our Oueen, Elizabeth II, as Meg mentioned last month. Certainly it will be a pretty amazing occasion, with garden parties and street parties, church teas and not to forget beacons being lit across the area, including one on the hill near us in Lingdale, just at the top of Birk Brow. The shops are also doing their part in encouraging us to get celebrating, with mugs and ties, teaspoons, hats, bunting a plenty, and just so much more. I can't help but wonder just how much of this was around 60 years ago?! and the Olympics later on, into events which we can celebrate together? How can we, as churches, share in these events which are important events in the life of our country and our communities? How can we bring a spiritual focus to these special events, that fosters but goes beyond community spirit, as we stand alongside all in our communities?

All of these celebratory events are ones that can build community, as well as a sense of working as a team, and can foster a new sense of life in our area, our towns, our villages, in our streets. And this month thoughts will also be turning to the Formation Flying Summer School at Windermere which this year has been thrown open to all who are interested in learning about the part they can play in the future lives of our churches, as we seek to gain the most out of new forms of team-working models to provide leadership and ministry to our churches. And remember that these two are not always the same thing! Maybe if we are ready to think afresh how our churches operate in terms of leadership and ministry and day to day management, then we will find that there are jobs and roles for us all?! So, thinking collaboratively, what might your part be? Team working means that if we all play our own small part the jobs get done more effectively and sometimes with fresh inspiration!

So just like today's Olympic games are no longer really like the original ancient games, or even like the first modern Olympics; and just like the monarchy has moved on over the 60 years of Elizabeth II's reign; so we need to be ready to move on in our churches, creating teams to share the workload just like the best of relay teams! Ready? Steady? Go!

A little Boy's Explanation of God – Fabulous!

'One of God's main jobs is making people. He makes them to replace the ones that die, so there will be enough people to take care of things on earth. He doesn't make grownups, just babies; I think because they are smaller and easier to make. That way he doesn't have to take up his valuable time teaching them to talk and walk. He can just leave that to mothers and fathers.'

'God's second most important job is listening to prayers. An awful lot of this goes on, since some people, like preachers and things, pray at times beside bedtime. God doesn't have time to listen to the radio or TV because of this. Because he hears everything, there must be a terrible lot of noise in his ears, unless he has thought of a way to turn it off.'

'God sees everything and hears everything and is everywhere which keeps Him pretty busy. So you shouldn't go wasting his time by going over your mom and dad's head asking for something they said you couldn't have.'

'Atheists are people who don't believe in God. I don't think there are any in Chula Vista. At least there aren't any who come to our church.'

'Jesus is God's Son. He used to do all the hard work, like walking on water and performing miracles and trying to teach people who didn't want to learn about God. They finally got tired of him preaching to them and the crucified him. But he was good and kind, like his father, and he told his father that they didn't know what they were doing and to forgive them and God said O.K.'

'His dad (God) appreciated everything that he had done and all his hard work on earth so he told him he didn't have to go out on the rod anymore. He could stay in heaven. So he did. And now he helps his dad out by listening to prayers and seeing things which are important for God to take care of and which ones he can take care of himself without having to bother God. Like secretary, only more important.'

'You can pray anytime you want and they are sure to help you because they got it worked out so one of them is on duty all the time.'

You should always go to church on Sunday because it makes God happy, and if there's anybody you want to make happy, it's God.

Don't skip church to do something you think will be more fun like going to the beach. This is wrong. And besides, the sun doesn't come out at the beach until noon anyway.'

'If you don't believe in God, besides being an atheist, you will be very lonely, because your parents can't go everywhere with you, like to camp, but God can. It is good to know He's around you when you're scared, in the dark or when you can't swim and you get thrown in real deep water by big kids.'

'But ... you shouldn't just always think of what God can do for you. I figure God put me here and he can take me back anytime he pleases. And ... that's why I believe in God.'

This phenomena is given different names according to the different places where it occurs.

Christian Aid Walk 2012

On the 12th May I set off at 5.30am to go to the Wyre Valley. It was a nice sunny morning and remained like that all day with a cool breeze.

I arrived at 8am just in time for tea being served. We listened then to an introduction talk about the walk. We got garrulous as we got to know each other.
