As we approach the seasons of Advent, Christmas and Epiphany, it seems an appropriate time to stop and take stock of our spiritual wellbeing.

some people have said that there could have been no more opportune moment for the coming of Jesus than the time God actually chose. The Roman empire, they argue, brought unparalleled peace and stability, an opportunity to travel as never before and an mixing of cultures that brought an openness to new ideas; just the sort of world in which the gospel could quickly spread. It's an argument that is tempting, but for me it doesn't work, - for the fact is that there are many other times in history for which an equally strong case could be made. If Jesus had come today, for example, how much more of an impact might He have made? Using modern technology He could have relayed His message around the world in seconds. Instead of preaching to small crowds on hillsides, He could have addressed whole nations live by satellite. Surely, if any era qualifies for the label, 'the best time for the message', it would be the 21st Century.

Yet God didn't choose this or any other date we might suggest, - He chose that day in the reign of the Emperor Augustus, when Mary and Joseph had gone to Bethlehem to be taxed. Why then? What was so special about that particular time? Well, the truth is that we just don't know, because we don't know how God's mind works. His timing is of His choosing, - no-one else's!

There's a lesson here for all of us, not just concerning the birth of Christ, but the whole of life. We may wonder sometimes why our prayers are not answered as quickly as we would like. Equally we might find that God is calling us to grasp the moment, when we want to hang back, reluctant to commit ourselves.

The coming season of Advent, and after the joys of Christmas, the season of Epiphany serve to remind us that God's timetable and ours are probably not the same; and as we begin to take stock of our spiritual journey maybe it's time that we asked ourselves whether we are prepared to put His timing first.

Over the years many people have tried to encourage me to follow daily Bible readings. They have given me copies of Daily Bread, exhorted me from the pulpit to read my Bible every day, but none of it has worked. Then the URC started to send a daily Bible reading, reflection and prayer to my email inbox every morning. Suddenly it is no longer an effort. I wake up, pick up my iPad mini, and check my emails. I am quite disappointed if I have to be up early and I miss it, returning to look again later in the day.

Recently we have been running through the stories of Samuel, Saul and David. These stories tackle some meaty issues such as the problem with Kings, the consequences of mental illness and paranoia, and the healing power of music. Also by following the story, it stops us avoiding those parts of the Bible we feel uncomfortable with. The tales of battles fought, the Philistines put to the sword and the killing of the priests at Saul's command in his jealousy and madness. There are so many lessons to learn in these tales of time long past. On Sundays we have had some respite while following the psalms and there too we find ourselves identifying with the emotions and longings of people writing thousands of years ago.

In the run up to Advent the daily readings are linked to newer Advent hymns that are perhaps not so familiar to us. The first one was not so new. "Hills of the North rejoice" is very familiar to me, as we sang it at school. It always seemed so appropriate to be singing this hymn in Hexham surrounded by the Northumberland hills. Some of the words have been altered in modern versions as it is no longer considered appropriate to describe the "isles of the Southern Seas" as "unvisited, unblessed". The final verse still creates a wonderful picture as people come together from all the points of the compass to worship God and find rest with Jesus.

I have also joined the Holy Habits book club this autumn. As I am
