As we struggle on in this seemingly never-ending series of lockdowns and absent from those we love, we just need to hang on to His

promise...our inheritance is certain, the promise is sure..signed and sealed!

Unfortunately, Sandra has recently suffered from the Covid 19 virus. We can all understand how this would be a worryingly difficult experience, but now Sandra is making a good recovery. From this point in the year we look forward to Easter - a time to celebrate the resurrection of our Lord Jesus. Whether we are together, as a fellowship, or not it will still be a special joyous occasion.
