## Pastoral Letter

'The Lord said to Abram, 'Leave your country, your kinfolk and your father's house and head for a land that i will show you.' Genesis 12 v. 1

What are we most afraid of? With me it's spiders, - other people have a fear of snakes. I can remember my son being afraid of the dark when he was small. According to those who claim to know there is one thing that all of us are afraid of still more, and that is quite simply fear of the unknown. Familiarity may breed contempt as the saying goes, but it also brings s sense of security, and the thought of venturing out into uncharted waters can be a daunting challenge, which I imagine that many of us prefer to avoid. It can be traumatic enough moving to a new house or starting a new job, - any change more radical than that can be bewildering indeed.

This, though, was the challenge faced by Abram, - later to be called Abraham. Comfortably settled in the town of Haran, he suddenly felt a call to move on. The destination was unclear, as were any details about what he might find when he eventually got there This was to be a step into the unknown, - a journey of faith.

Few of us today will be asked to make such a bold decision, yet there are times when we need to let go of the tried and trusted nonetheless. We may be called to a new venture, or a new lifestyle, not knowing where they might lead or what will be asked of us. We may be asked to make new friends, embrace new ideas or explore new horizons that, once again, we have no way of quantifying. Will we be ready to respond if we believe God is speaking to us, not putting off a decision to weigh up all the implications, or brushing aside what we'd rather not hear, - but following, - stepping out in faith?

We may not know what the future holds, but we do know who holds it, and surely that should be sufficient inspiration for us?

co-incidences for them not to be God-incidences. I am now happy, settled and at peace.

A friend of mine has just moved house too. His first offer went on an apartment in Scarborough, but this fell through. He was so disappointed and wondered whether to continue. However, he waited and another one came up, this time in Saltburn where he really wanted to be. He is now living there and is very happy.

Prayer can sometimes be very difficult, even feel impossible, but persevere and your prayer will always be answered, though maybe not in the way you are expecting. God knows what is best for us. Trust Him, He is faithful.

**Prayer**, **Perseverance** and **Trust** were the things I learnt, and the result has been Joy, abundant Joy, and a closer relationship with God. God bless you all.
