This month our minister's letter is from our friend and recently appointed interim moderator, Rev Norma Johnson.

Let me tell you a story of a king, king Darius. One day he brought together his three closest men who both guarded and advised him in order to decide which one of them should be his chief adviser. It was suggested that they each wrote down their answer to this question, 'What is the strongest?'

They would all write down their answer, put it in a sealed envelope and the envelopes would be put under the king's pillow for him to open the next morning.

One had written 'Wine is the strongest' because a man is brave under its influence and is ready to kill and make trouble and in the morning he cannot remember anything about it.

The second wrote, 'Women are the strongest' because men will do anything to please her and keep her happy.

The third, by the name of Zerubbabel, wrote, 'It is true that the king is great, that men are many and that wine is strong, but who rules over them, who is the master? Surely it is Women.'

Zerubbabel then went on to speak about 'Truth'. 'Sirs, we have seen that women are strong, the earth is vast, but Truth also is great, it is stronger than all else. The whole earth calls on truth for in it there is no injustice. There is injustice in wine and kings and women, in all men and their works; but Truth abides and remains strong for ever. There is no favouritism, no partiality in truth; in her judgement, there is no injustice. Hers are strength and royalty, the authority and majesty of all ages.

Praise be to the God of Truth! The king said, Zerubbabel you have proved to be the wisest, ask what you will. Zerubbabel answered, 'Remember the vow you made when you came to the throne; you promised to rebuild Jerusalem and you also made a vow to rebuild the temple. This is what I ask of you, that you fulfil the vow you

made to the King of heaven.' The king granted his request and Zerubbabel praised God saying, 'From you come victory and wisdom, yours is the glory, and I am your servant. All praise to you for you have given me wisdom.' His fellow Jews praised the God of their fathers who had given them leave and liberty to go up and build Jerusalem and the temple which bore his name.

How and with what shall we build the Church of Christ whose foundation is Jesus Christ, the chief cornerstone. Recently we were given the good news that the East Cleveland Group could declare a vacancy. One of the first tasks we set about is to prepare a Church Profile, in our case three profiles, one for each Church, and consider how we connect with one another within the Group. It's a time to consider not only how we see ourselves but how others may see us. When we look in a mirror we see an image, other people see the real me. Let's take an honest look at ourselves, our weaknesses as well as our strengths for what we leave out of a profile may be more telling than what we put in to it. A goal needs a plan and a process and during the first process I invite each member to spend five minutes a day to pray about it. My intention is to produce a small prayer card which will be available at our Group Service on the 9th September.

Jesus said, 'I am the way, the truth and the life.'

May we continue to support and encourage one another as we seek to be the Church of Christ and reflect his love in the world.

An Article from Footsteps:

HomelessnessWhat can we do?

I often walk past people who have been sleeping rough and I wonder how best to help them. The main question I have is about why they are there.

Recently NECAT (North East Churches Acting Together) held a day conference for people from across the Churches in the NE. Mel, our Synod Clerk, and I both attended. No one really answered my wondering in specific ways but I came away understanding more about how some people do come to live on the streets. One speaker did talk of how many find family life difficult and can no longer remain at home, including the story of a young 12 year old, whose parents sent him out regularly to prostitute himself and then take his earnings back to mum and dad!!! I find it quite shocking and hard to imagine in some ways as my own upbringing was so good in comparison but, in other ways, due to my time as a teacher in a primary school, I am aware that many children do not find the safety and security in their homes that is theirs by right.

At the conference we were encouraged not to judge the homeless but to give to them. The hope was that The church in Crook has been a place of love, worship and prayer for 150 years. St Andrew's Dawson Street was built in 1868 and with other Methodist churches joining over the years had we would give money but I have always struggled to do so because I don't want to be feeding drug or alcohol addictions. But two major ways in which, we as individuals, as congregations and as a synod can engage is through prayer and also by taking on the Government to ensure that good housing is available for those who are in need.

We could give funding and other aid to projects, one of which is the Key Project run by churches in South Tyneside. Set up way back in 1992, it is an organisation which enables young people aged 16 - 24 to learn the skills to live independently. It employs

some staff but also uses young people, mainly students, as volunteers. In 2017 some of the achievements were that 121 young people received housing advice and guidance, 36 families used mediation to resolve their issues and concerns, 477 food packs were given out, 66 young people were supported in their first flats (www.keyproject.org.uk)

Another initiative is Green Pastures Community Benefit Society, an ethical organisation which looks for folk like us to invest our cash so that property can be purchased to house the homeless. There is an interest rate of no more than 5%. The project has, at present, 1000+ investors, 900+ people have been housed and partners ensure that the rent on these properties is paid and that the houses are maintained well. Could we, as individuals or as congregations or as a synod become involved? www.greenpastures.net/invest

In Gateshead, Oasis Aquila Housing is a Christian charity supporting families and individuals who are homeless or vulnerably housed. www.oasisaquilahousing.org

Nightstop North East is a venture whereby vulnerable young people or adults are offered a bed by couples or families who have a spare bedroom. Advice is offered as these folk are encouraged to find their own homes and people with drug or alcohol addictions are not helped in order to protect the volunteers offering room.

Homelessness isn't confined to those living on the streets for many families find themselves having live in hostels. Also many individuals and families live in rented housing which is not really fit for purpose and this issue is also being addressed by some agencies The festival was opened by Baroness Hilary Armstrong and Jean Cowing JP. Many visitors and guests enjoyed the festival's weekend of And, of course, there are many refugees within our synod who need to be housed. There are several agencies across our synod helping here (West End Refugee Service in Newcastle along with others). Action Foundation was one we heard about at the conference learning that not only are hosts and rooms found but

also daily bus tickets given out along with advice and help as refugees move into their own accommodation www.actionfoundation.org.uk

The main theme I picked up during the day was that we need to take on board DIT rather than DIY. DIT is Do it Together and, of course all the projects mentioned are about empowering people to find and enjoy good quality homes. And if we can relate all of this to 'Walking the Way' we would need to consider what Jesus would do so that we can be living his life tod

obstacles to be overcome included a constant need for repair of the building, a lack of any heating (hot water bottles provided) and a small, aging congregation.

Through the morning, there was stimulation for all senses in walks from the village. The meadows were being cut so the sweet smell of warm grasses filled the air. A small blue tractor was about the business of lifting the rows of flat stems, swishing them around to dry in the heat of the day: the rhythm of the machinery a sound track to my walk.

Each of us came to the lunch break with some vision/focus to share. Stephen and Graham were photographers, Meryl wanted to explore lino printing techniques and I had brought some threads and fabrics for who knows what!

The countryside of the upper Dales where Keld sits was on that day a vision of God's beauty. We were surrounded by images from Psalm 104, verses from which Stephen had chosen for further reflections leading us perfectly into a peaceful time of afternoon creativity.

By the close of our time together, we all had thoughts and images to share – some spoken or planned but others in print, photo or stitch. Surprisingly, although we all chose to use these different media, there was some continuity across our inspiration. Aware of everything had stimulated our senses and we found that we had some shared focus.

The field patterns had suggested the care and protection of a Good Shepherd. The photographers had recorded roads and tracks including people coming in and going out which to them suggested living the Christian life. The stone used in the landscape and buildings could be an example of permanence and strength in the Christian community.

Our final prayer provided a gentle end to our day together.

Although the day is now ended,

as we return to our homes and routines,

may the joy we have had today and the inspiration that has fired us,

stay with us as we continue to seek you through our creative endeavours

and give voice through them to our faith in you. Amen
