Pastoral Letter

'Assess yourselves to check that you are living in the faith. Test yourselves to make sure'

2 Corinthians 13

The older we get, the more it pays to keep a check on our health. That's not to say we should become morbid hypochondriacs, simply that we should keep an eye out for problems so that we can seek help to put them right before they take hold. If that is true medically speaking, it's true also when it comes to our spiritual health, for that can easily suffer as the years go by. Complacency, disillusionment or sheer weariness are all conditions that can steal upon us, sapping our faith of its vitality. Just as with our physical well-being, we need to be alert to the signs, regularly making time to examine ourselves.

Traditionally, Lent is such a time, calling us to reflect on our discipleship and to ask ourselves if everything is as it should be. None of us is perfect, of course, and the last thing God wants is to encourage a spirit of negative self-criticism. Rather, he was us to conduct an honest self-appraisal and then to seek His gracious help in bringing inner healing and renewal. The cure doesn't lie in us, any more that self-help remedies are the answer to every physical ailment. It lies in recognising something is wrong and seeking help from the one who alone is able to give us wholeness. If we are willing to admit our need, he will do the rest.

May you find Lent this year a time of new hope and refreshment., and may the Lord bless you with His presence.

Guisborough

In February at Guisborough Methodist Church a Food and Fun session was organised by the Guisborough Bridge Association. The activities were aimed at children aged 4 to 12 With with crafts and other activities plus a delicious menu. Food being probably the most popular activity of the session consisted of pasta Bolognese or cheesy pasta Bake, carrot and cucumber sticks, pancakes, yoghurt and fresh fruit. Such a spread was just thing to get youngsters ready for a really fun time.

This event is just one of many activities organised by the Bridge during the 23 years of its existence - being staffed by willing volunteers under the leadership of Project Manager and Administrator, Lorraine Nash.

The idea to form an organisation to to address local needs within the community came from the Churches Together Group at the beginning of the new millennium. The first project was a youth activities group held in a vacant shop in Bose Street. This was a trial activity which lasted for a short period until the premises was taken back into business activity. Following this the youth work was moved to the premises above a shop in Westgate where it function for a number of years - and then moved on to a place in Laurence Jackson School where it was possible to expand the number of activities.

During the early years the Bridge expanded into other areas such as Soup and Roll fundraising activity at the Methodist Church, Lunch club, work with the elderly and other activities. At this time work was managed by Jenny Tiery
