Christian Aid Week 14-20 May

Your gifts this Christian Aid Week could help farmers in Malawi plant better seeds, seSoaring costs are affecting people here and around the world.

Families in Malawi are paying the price of this global crisis.

Food, fuel, fertiliser and school fees have doubled in price in the last 12 months. And hard-working farmers are seeing their harvests fail as the climate crisis brings increasingly erratic weather.cure a fairer price for the crops, and build happier futures for their children.

Cyclone Freddy, the longest-lasting tropical cyclone on record (lasting 34 days), has hit Malawi and Mozambique. This cyclone is the equivalent of a full North Atlantic hurricane season.

Malawi experienced a year's worth of rain during the 4-week cyclone. The number of people affected by the Tropical Cyclone in Malawi continues to rise. Over 508,000 people are displaced and hundreds have lost their lives. There's also an increased risk of malaria and cholera in the immediate aftermath.

"It's not just here and there, we are at the receiving end of the worst of climate change... It's not a matter of saying be charitable to your neighbour, this has to do with loss and damage, this has to do with responses that are not tokenism."

Our response

Our partners and team in Malawi have been responding to the immediate recovery needs of communities. This includes:

- Corn soya blend for porridge for breastfeeding mothers and children under 5 years
- Mosquito nets for families to provide protection against malaria
- Providing temporary toilets and bathrooms, water containers and water treatment to help prevent the risk of cholera
- Mobile clinics to help people process the emotional trauma of the cyclone
- Distribution of cash to 1,000 households so that families can purchase their immediate needs

What a dilemma.

Reflecting on this situation and praying about it, I have decided to stay in my new church but keep in touch with my old one. I feel as if I have moved on. This got me to thinking about our journey through life with Jesus. Things do change, and we do move on, but always with Him. He never leaves us. We are led to make changes by God, and for a reason. Our task on earth is to go where we are taken and trust Him to know what He is doing. If we are willing to listen He will give us our new instructions for the next stage of our lives. We only have to trust and be willing to serve. I have still not discovered what I am to do here, but it doesn't appear to involve children. I have a feeling it may be along the lines of prayer groups and possibly counselling, or at least providing a safe space for those who need rest. Who knows? God does but He takes things calmly and slowly. I am normally an impulsive and impatient person, but I think I am being taught to be less so. I am finding God so exciting and can't wait to find out what new things He has in store. He is exhilarating indeed.
